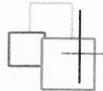

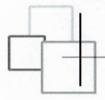

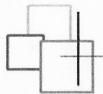

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF FORKS AMENDING FORKS MUNICIPAL CODE PROVISIONS SETTING WATER SERVICE RATES.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FORKS AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. PURPOSE

This ordinance is being adopted to adjust the base rate charged for water services, meter rates, and new service connections to meet the necessary obligations, operations, additions, and changes in the Forks Water System. Due to significant increases in material costs associated with the provision of water services, the Council has determined that adjustments are needed in addition to the consumer price index increases required by FMC 13.30.050, which will be 3.8% for 2025. During budget workshops, the Council considered various approaches and determined that an additional ten percent (10%) is necessary to meet the continually increasing material costs experienced by the City.

<u>SECTION 2.</u> Amending FMC 13.30.010 – Meter Rates. Forks Municipal Code 13.30.010 is hereby amended and replaced with the following:

(1) The following schedule of meter rates shall be the basic rate for 400 cubic feet or less of water used by the consumer:

\$4.00 per each 100 cubic feet

\$5.89 per each 100 cubic feet

For every 100 cubic feet of water used over 1,000 cubic feet, the City shall charge the following:

\$4.52 per each 100 cubic feet

<u>SECTION 3. Amending FMC 13.30.010 – Meter Rates</u>. Forks Municipal Code 13.30.010 is hereby amended and replaced with the following:

Trailer parks, apartment houses, motels renting units as apartments, without individual meters, will be charged in addition to the minimum and meter charges the sum of \$8.14 per unit for each apartment, trailer, and/or unit in addition to the regular bill.

<u>SECTION 4. Amending FMC 13.30.030 – Connection Charges</u>. Forks Municipal Code 13.30.030 is hereby amended and replaced with the following:

- (1) Service charges for meter installation shall be \$1640.42, up to a three-quarters inch meter (3/4") for installation within the corporate limits of the City of Forks.
- (2) Service charges for meter installation shall be \$1866.33, up to a (¾") for installation outside the corporate limits of the City of Forks.

When a new meter is required to be installed in association with a new service, the City will charge for the following:

- 1) the cost paid by the City for all parts used in the installation;
- 2) the hourly rate to the nearest quarter of an hour of each staff member involved in the installation;
- 3) the hourly rate to the nearest quarter of an hour of mechanical equipment used in the installation; and,
- 4) an administrative fee of ten percent (10%) applied to the subtotal of the three components noted above.

The meter will be installed after the estimate is paid. Any remaining amount due above the estimate will be due 30 days after completion of the installation.

SECTION 5. Corrections

The City Attorney, City Clerk and the codifiers of this ordinance are authorized to make any necessary corrections to this ordinance to include such things as scrivener's/clerical errors, references, ordinance number, section/subsection numbers, etc. Any such corrections cannot alter or impair the purposes and objectives associated with the adoption of this ordinance by the City Council.

<u>SECTION 2. Amending FMC 13.10.010.</u> Forks Municipal Code 13.10.010 is hereby amended and replaced with the following:

Charges for sewer service furnished by the City of Forks shall be as follows:

For each month (or portion of a month, where service is commenced or ended at a time other than the regular monthly meter-reading date) the following rates shall be charged, and due when billed:

Separate family residence including each unit of a duplex.

\$48.21 per unit

Apartment houses, meaning any multi-family residential structure or complex containing three (3) or more residential units.

\$48.21 per unit

Mobile home courts

\$<u>48.21</u> per

occupied mobile home space and \$6.86 per recreational vehicle space

An ordinance authorizing an interfund loan from the Current Expense Fund to the Street Project Fund

BASED THEREON, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FORKS DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

- Section 1. The recitals above are hereby adopted by the City Council as the findings for this ordinance.
- Section 2. Interfund Loan Authorized. The City Councill hereby authorizes an interfund loan subject to the terms and conditions as follows:
 - (a) An interfund loan in an amount not to exceed \$389,830 is hereby approved to be made from the Current Expense Fund to the Street Fund.
 - (b) Per State guidelines, this type of transaction need not require interest to be imposed upon the interfund loan.
 - (c) This loan is to be considered "temporary" and not a "permanent diversion" of funds.
 - (d) The loan period is set for two months with the payment of principal due at or prior to the end of the second-month loan period.
 - (e) The loan period above may be extended for an additional 30 days.
- Section 3. Effective Date. This ordinance shall take effect five days after it has been published within the City's journal of record as provided for by law.

Good morning from a rainy Forks.

On Monday night, I shared with the City Council portions of the presentation that you and your colleagues so kindly did for me regarding the Forks Risk and the FY 20 Riverine Physical Map Revision. Based upon the presentation, the City is interested in learning more about ways to reduce the potential of nuisance flooding that may occur, based upon the model's analysis, in the area east of SR 101/Forks Avenue between East E Street and East G Street. As the City does not have engineering staff or contractors familiar with this type of modeling, we would request assistance from FEMA and the StarII team on issues associated with the various culverted crossings of SR 101/Forks Avenue that could be utilized to reduce nuisance flooding.

The City is also very grateful for the work being done to date on the areas west of SR 101/Forks Avenue. Doing the detailed mapping of Warner Creek appears to be changing the application of floodway designations in this part of our community. The City is looking forward to a future public meeting in Forks to learn more about this and share this information with the Community.

Hi Rod,

I left you a brief voicemail – following up to connect you with Ryon Ragan (cc'ed) who is going to be the project manager for the flood mitigation scenarios effort we discussed (related thread attached). This is an initial pilot effort on our end to test out what we call "Mitigation Planning Technical Assistance". We are hoping to be able to provide more support like this in conjunction with flood map updates for other communities in the future. Looking forward to working with the City of Forks on this work!

Ryon will coordinate with you to get a call scheduled in January to discuss the project scope and timeline in more detail.

Here's a summary of the scope:.

Scope

The goal of the Mitigation Planning and Technical Assistance project for Forks, WA is to provide additional hydraulic model scenarios to inform future efforts to mitigate flooding. The scenarios would be based on the existing Warner Creek 2D hydraulic model used to support the FY20 Physical Map Revision. Changes would be made to assess the impact of culvert replacement or similar mitigation options at key locations. The technical assistance was requested by the community as part of the Flood Risk Review comments. To provide the greatest benefit to the community, the scope includes a project kickoff meeting to confirm the mitigation scenarios and collect any community data that might be available. A separate meeting would be held to review the results of the hydraulic model and confirm the data presented on exhibits provided as part of the project.

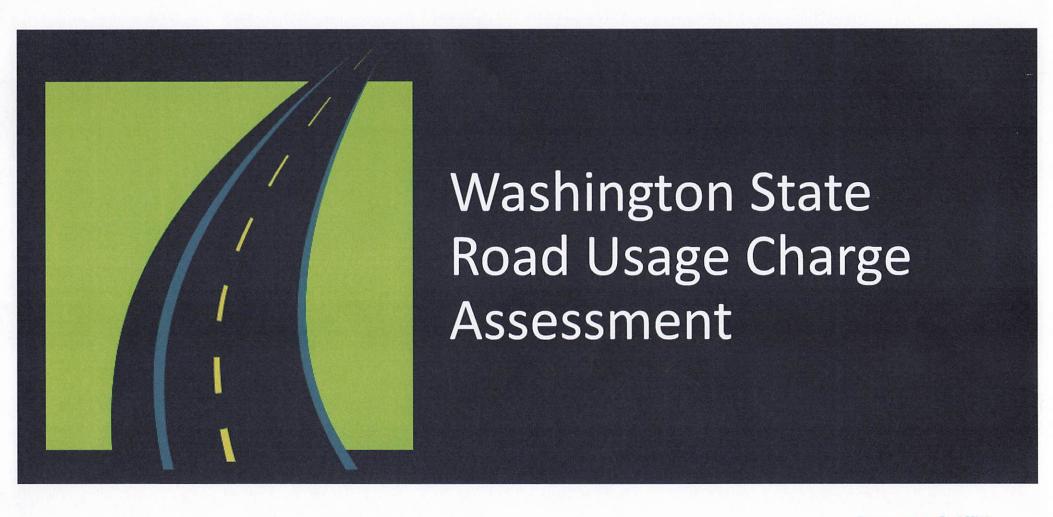

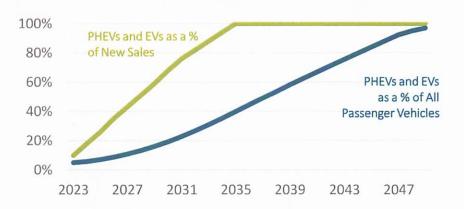

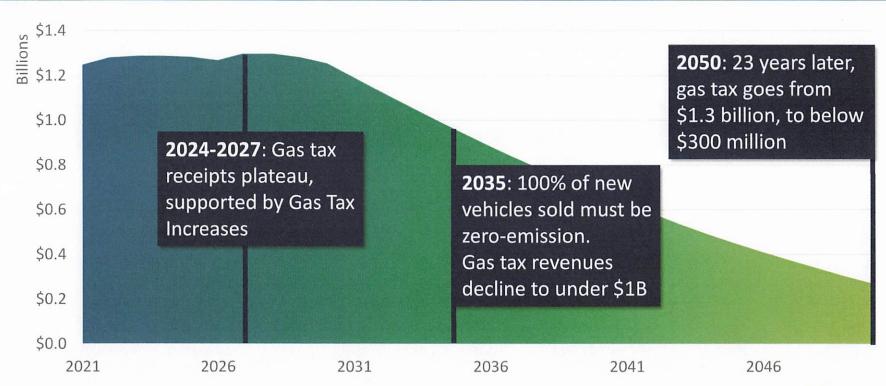

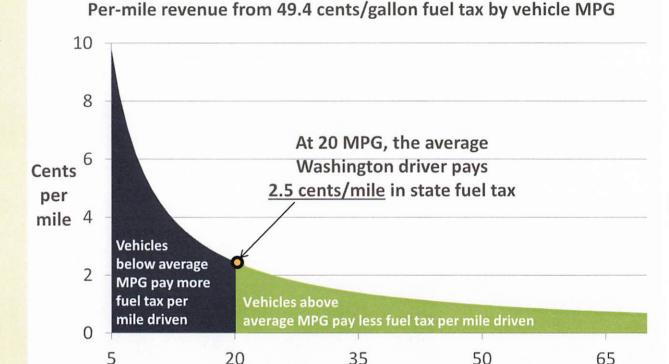


Gasoline Tax Revenues Decline as Fuel Efficiency Grows



Taxing Gallons Has Fairness & Equity Challenges

- The gas tax is fair because it is based on a simple principle: user pays, user benefits.
- As vehicles become more fuel efficient and alternative fuels emerge, this principle is shifting to a "some users pay/all users benefit."
- RUC returns us to the user pay, user benefits principle.

Drivers would pay RUC OR Gas tax – not both

RUC Charges Will Not Be on Top of The Gas Tax

Gas taxes paid will be treated as a prepayment or credit towards RUC charges:



The amount of fuel tax a driver pays can be directly measured or estimated using miles driven and EPA fuel economy ratings.



Other benefits of leaving the gas tax in place:



Supports seamless interstate travel. NOTE: Only 5-8% of total VMT is attributable to out-of-state drivers.



Enables small, incremental payments (gas tax paid at the pump) toward RUC for gas cars.



Serves as a natural backstop against tax evasion.



Ensures Washington state can meet its legal requirements for outstanding bonds.



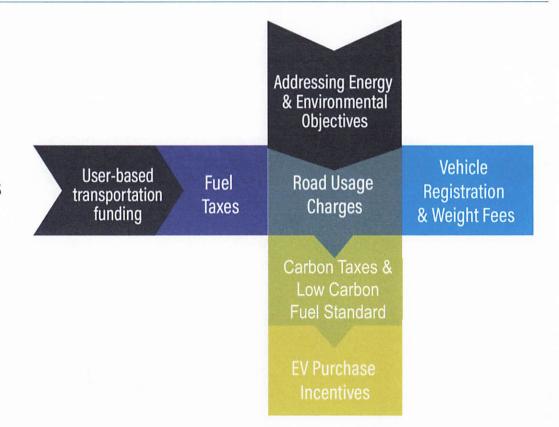

RUC supports the transition to EVs & alternative fuels

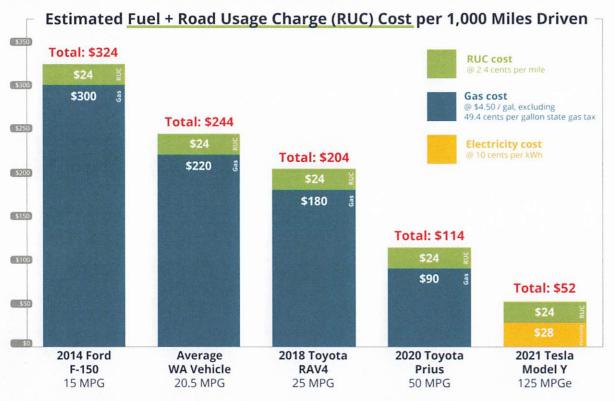
RUC Harmonizes Funding and Climate Goals

- Removes the need to rely on the consumption of fossil fuels to fund our transportation system.
- RUC is an alternative to current flat registration fees for EVs and hybrids (\$225 and \$75 respectively).
- Provides sustainable funding for infrastructure that will be used increasingly by highly fuel-efficient and alternatively fueled vehicles.





EVs Maintain Overall Operating Cost Advantage in a RUC System



While RUC does result in drivers of fuel efficient vehicles paying a little more in taxes for transportation as compared to the gas tax, the overall cost advantage of owning a fuel efficient, hybrid, or EV remains significant. For example, under RUC, owners of a Prius will pay \$210 per month less than the Ford pickup truck driver.

- EV drivers maintain a significant operating cost advantage under RUC, compared to gaspowered vehicles, given fuel costs remain a significant cost.
- Under a future RUC system, participating EVs & hybrids would not pay the current flat annual registration fees.

(EVs = \$225; hybrids = \$75)

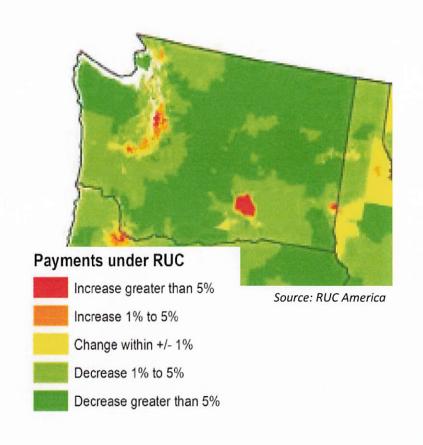

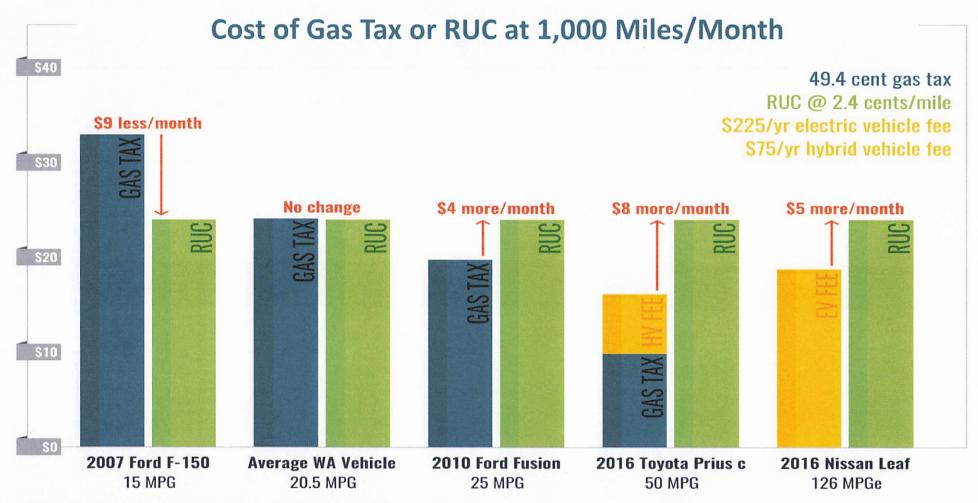
What you drive, not how far you drive determines the impact of RUC relative to gas taxes

Rural, Long-Distance Drivers & Low-Income Drivers Will Pay Less Under RUC

- Residents in rural and lower-income areas tend to own vehicles with lower fuelefficiency (low MPG) on average.
- Lower MPG = higher costs for fuel and fuel tax.
- Rather than paying as much as 4 to 6
 cents per mile today under the state gas
 tax, drivers of low MPG vehicles would
 pay less under a flat RUC rate of 2.5 cents
 per mile.



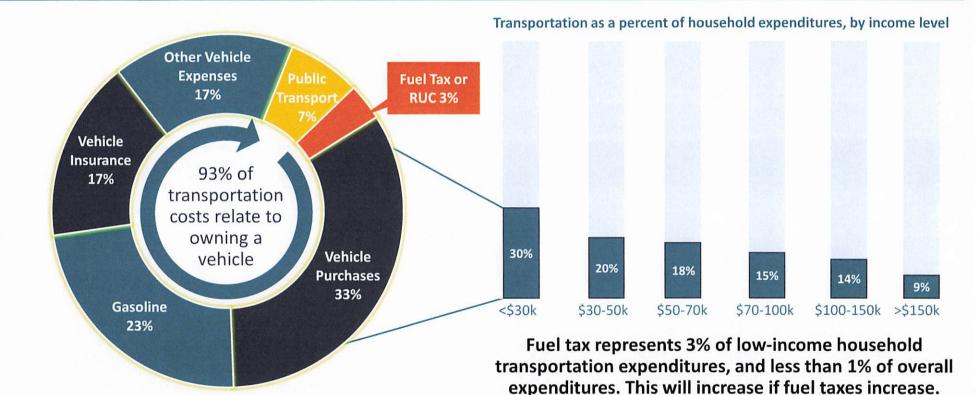




What you drive will determine the cost impact of RUC:

- · Less fuel efficient vehicles will see a decrease in the amount of taxes paid
- · More fuel efficient vehicles will see an increase in the amount of taxes paid
- · The total effect is that all drivers pay the same rate to use the roads—regardless of their vehicle's MPG

Transportation Taxes Are a Small Proportion of Household Costs



With RUC, targeted discounts can be offered.

Key Findings Impact to Privacy

WA RUC

It starts with system design, user choice, and legal protections

RUC Does Not Require GPS Technology – Privacy Can be Protected



The only new piece of information needed for RUC that the state Department of Licensing does not already collect is total miles driven.



Drivers would decide how to report their miles, including whether to use location services.



RUC enabling law can include provisions to protect privacy, drawing on the Commission's model policy.



Any mileage reporting method that uses location services is strictly for the convenience of the driver (e.g., to automatically deduct out-of-state and off-road miles).

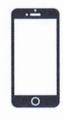


Drivers Pick How they Want to Report Miles



Odometer Reading (28% in pilot)

- · Post-pay for miles reported quarterly
- Report miles either electronically or in person



MileMapper Smartphone App – GPS on/off (14% in pilot)

- Navigational GPS can be turned on/off
- Available only on iPhone iOS
- · Records miles using a smartphone
- Works with all vehicles



Mileage Permit (1% in pilot)

- Pre-select a block of miles (1,000, 5,000, 10,000)
- Report odometer either electronically or in person every three months
- Obtain additional miles as needed to keep mileage permit valid



Plug-in Devices - With Or Without GPS (56% in pilot - 19% w/o GPS/ 37% w/GPS)

- Automated mileage meter with GPS and non-GPS options
- Plugs into OBD-II ports in vehicles 1996 or newer
- GPS-enabled devices automatically deduct out-of-state miles

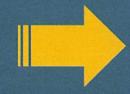

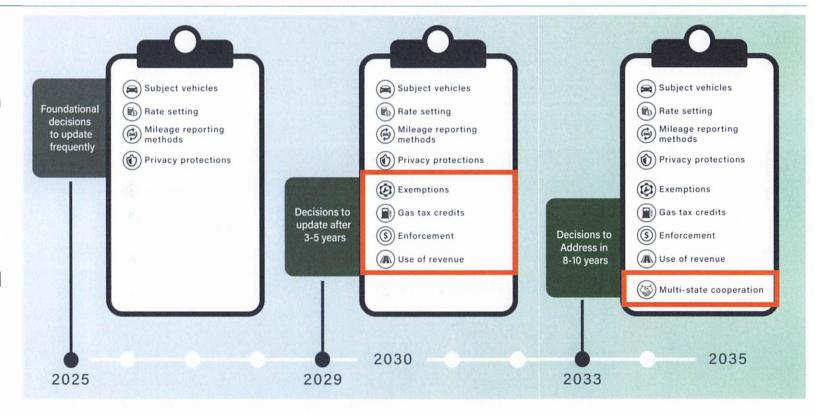

DRAFT Guiding Principles for 2025 Road Usage Charge Legislation

Overall objective:

Generate sustainable, long-term revenue for transportation

- 1. Fairness: Ensure drivers pay for their usage of public roads.
- Privacy: Establish legislation that protects driver privacy and their data.
- 3. Reporting: Provide convenient reporting options for drivers.
- 4. Transition: Structure a mileage-based program that is implemented in stages to allow for effective operations that also encourages consumer participation.

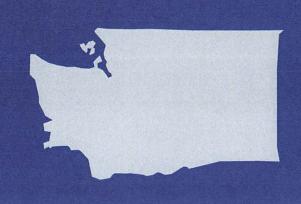




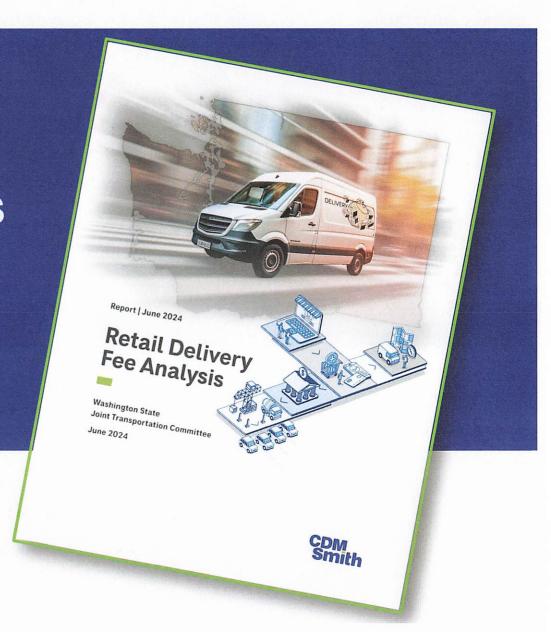

Funding conundrum: more driving but less gas tax

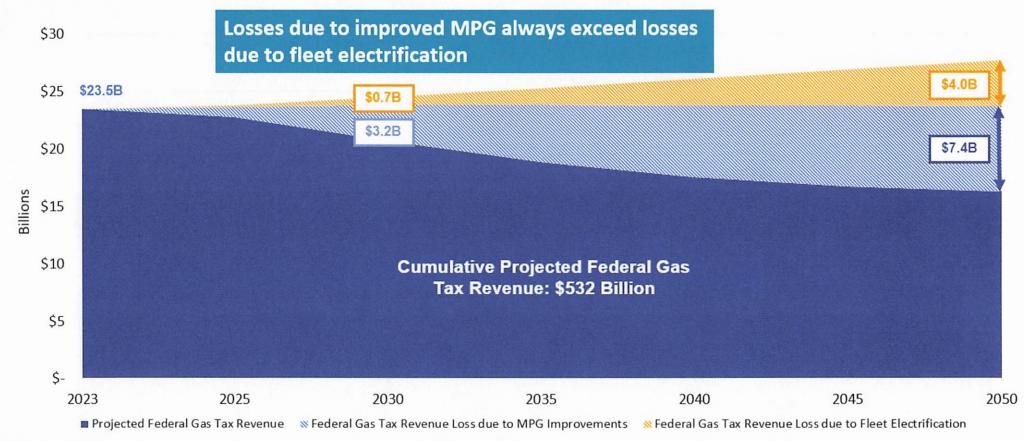




Electric Vehicles

Federal Gas Tax Revenue Stream

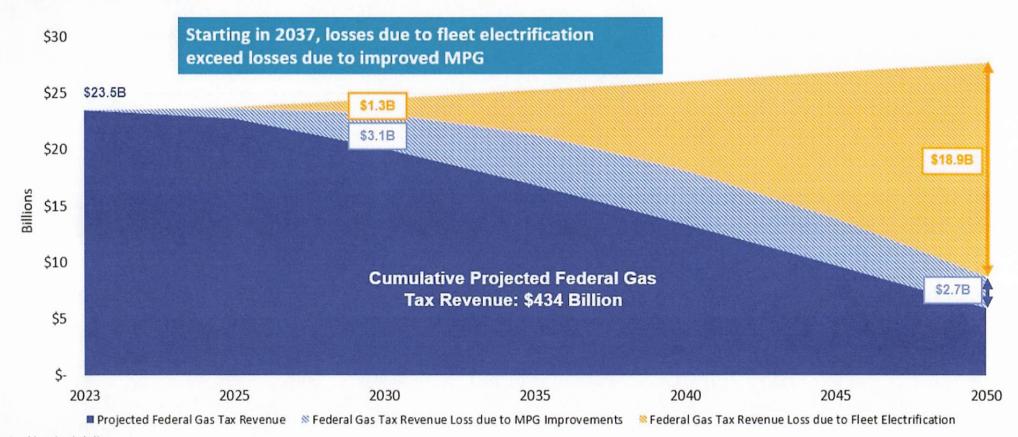
Slow EV Adoption (EIA)

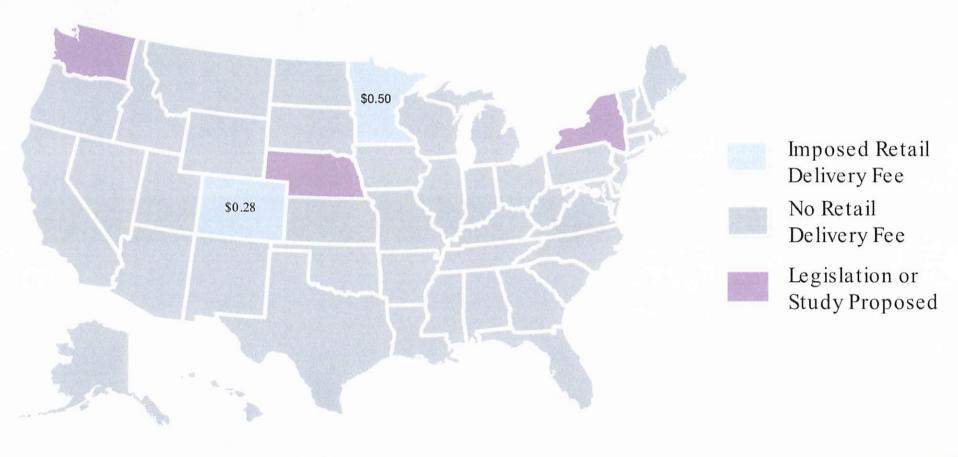
Federal Gas Tax Revenue Stream

2024 Retail Delivery Fees by State



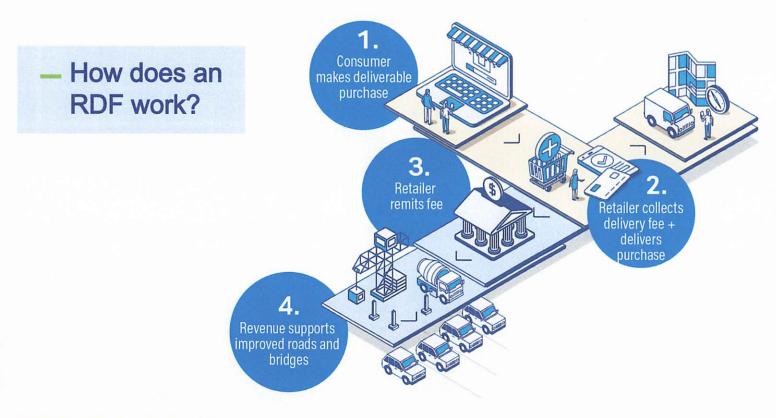

What is a Retail Delivery Fee?

Generally, an RDF is a fee imposed on the delivery of retail items delivered by motor vehicles in the state.



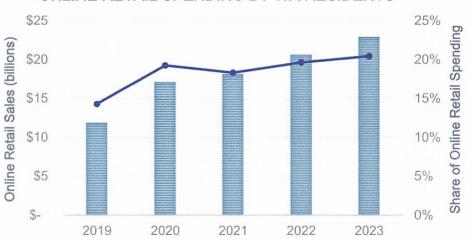
Why Study A Retail Delivery Fee (RDF)?

After a Year of Implementation, Colorado Amended the Retail Deliver Fee Based on Feedback from Businesses.

Minnesota modeled their RDF after Colorado's, taking into account these important changes



Small business exemption

The collection and remittance of the delivery fee was an added administrative cost and burden on the operation of the business.



Change made: Colorado now exempts from the fee businesses that have \$500,000 or less in annual sales.



Collection of fee

Retailers were initially required to itemize fees, forcing the business to identify the retail delivery fee on receipts and thus collect and remit the fee to the state.



Change made: Colorado now provides a choice to businesses:retailers may itemize the fee (shows on receipt) and collect it from the customer OR the business may incorporate the fee into the price of the product and pay the fee directly to the state (does not show on receipt).

Revenue Generation Tool

The tool provides the Legislature with revenue generation estimates, and corresponding revenue

distribution, under different scenarios.

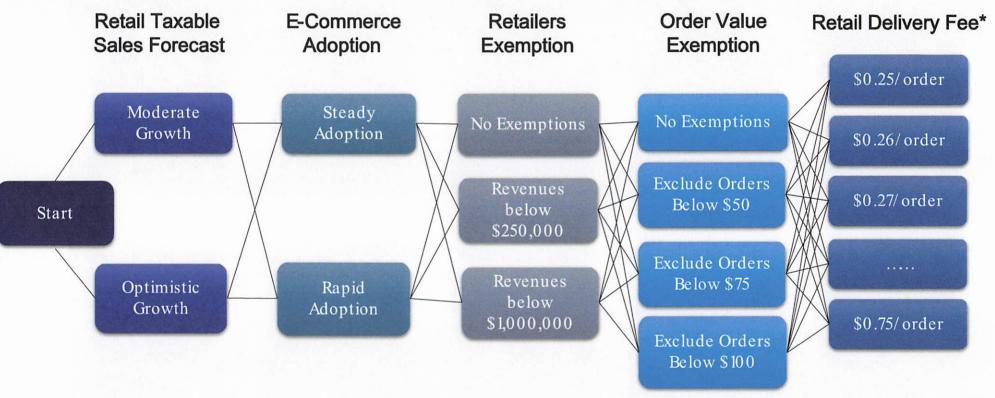

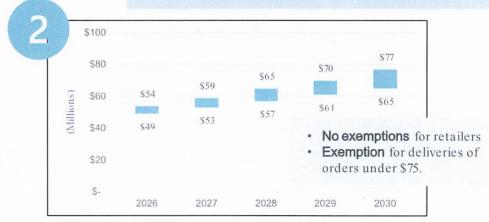

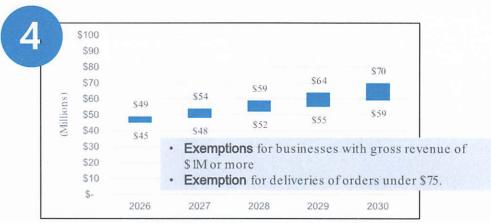

General Assumptions

- Assuming a January 1, 2026, effective date for costing purposes.
- Applicable to taxable retail sales of "tangible personal property."
- No order value exemption.
- New businesses or small businesses with gross revenues/sales less than \$1 million in the previous calendar year will be exempt.
- The RDF is owed by the seller regardless of whether the seller delivers the goods themselves or hires a third party to deliver.

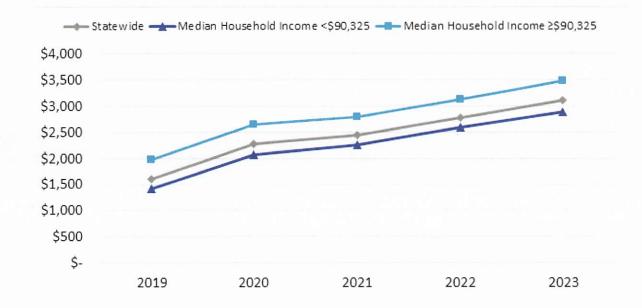
Consumer Impacts



Generally, individuals from urban areas spend significantly more in the aggregate on e-retail purchases.

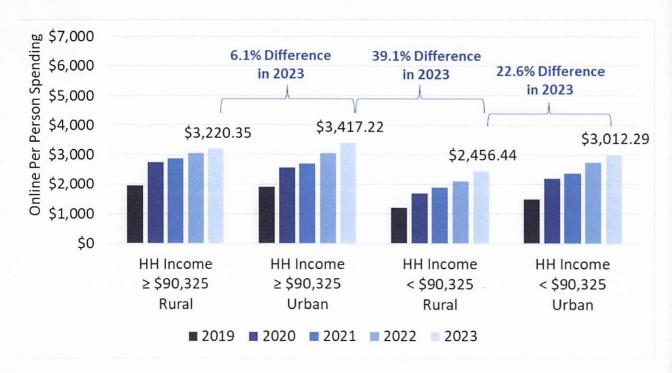
E-commerce spending by individuals in urban areas was \$365 greater per person in 2019, and this gap in spending increased to \$586 in 2023.

Consumer Impacts



Generally, households with an average income above the statewide median of \$90,325 tend to spend about \$500 more on online retail purchases than those from lower-income tracts

Consumer Impacts



- Generally, households with an income above the statewide median tend to spend more on e-commerce than those below the statewide median, regardless of location.
- Those who live in urban areas tend to spend more on online retail purchases than those from rural areas

Business Impacts

Small, medium and large-sized businesses shared theotential impacts of a retail delivery fee

- Addressing this issue of transportation funding should not fall solely upon the business community.
- Administrative and operational impact on businesses, particularly regarding tax collection.
- The burden placed on businesses to enforce compliance with a delivery fee.
- Implications of any new fee on existing local regulations.

Potential solutions to address these concerns include:

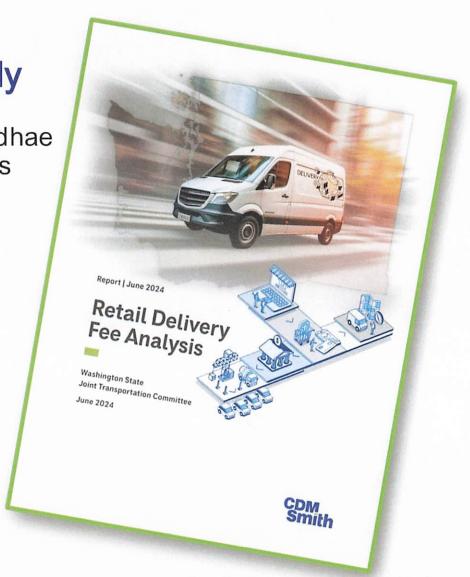
- Implementing exemptions based on revenue thresholds and
- Minimizing the administrative burden of collecting the fee

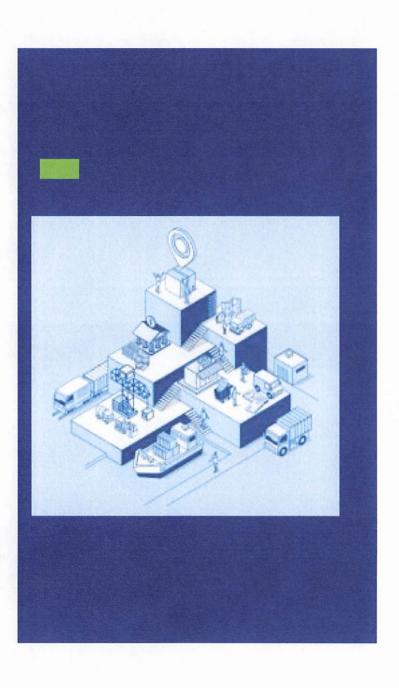


Summary: Washington RDF Study

A retail delivery would generate moderate revenue, require low administrative costs andhae a slightly greater impact on urban households

- A 30-cent rate would generate \$122 and \$145 million by 2030
- Individuals in urban areas and those with higher incomes would bear more of the burden of a fee
- \$250,000 startup and \$125,000 ongoing administrative costs
- Impacts to businesses can be mitigated by creating a small business threshold exemption
